




the same time frame.




Distinct patterns in AI/AN cancer

AI/AN in the Pacific Coast have fewer cancer disparities than in other regions, but show similar or worse rates for some of the top cancers when compared to Whites.


Most Common Cancers: Pacific Coast







Kinds of Violence

- ***Emotional Abuse***

The women/man insults the women/man, puts her/him down, or makes her/him think she/he is going crazy.

- ***Sexual Abuse***

The women/man makes the women/man do sexual things against her/him will or physically attacks the sexual parts of her/his body. She/ He treats her/him like an object.

- ***Controlling Money***

The women/man tries to keep the women/man from getting a job or making her/his money. She/he makes her/him ask her/him for any money she/he needs. Or she/he may force her/him to work and take any money she/he has earns.

- ***Blaming Her/him***

The women/man says the abuse did not really happen, that it was not serious, or that it was the women's/man's fault.

- ***Using Children***

The women/man uses the children to make the women/man feel guilty, or to hurt her/him.

- ***Because He is A 'Man'***

The man uses the fact that he is a man as an excuse to treat the women like a servant. He makes all the decisions and tells her that, as a women, she has no right to object.

- ***Making Threats***

The women/man uses a look, action, tone of voice, or makes threats, that make the women feel afraid that she/he will hurt her/him.

- ***Isolation***

The women/man control s everything the women/man does-who she/he sees and talks to, and where she/he goes.

These are different kinds of violence to help the abuser gain power and control.

To celebrate this momentous event, we invite Native American student teams from Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and Washington to enter a competition to develop a high altitude balloon payload that will fly to the edge of space during the eclipse and gain an unprecedented view of the shadow of the moon on our Earth.

The Warm Springs Unmanned Aerial Systems (WSUAS) is an FAA approved test range, one of 12 in the United States, and the only range that is owned by a sovereign tribal nation. As a national test site, we serve much like an airport for drones. We feel fortunate to offer research and development for STEM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics) activities, plus incredible partnership with NASA, OMSI, SOAR Oregon, University of Alaska, University of Oregon, University of Washington, and the FAA.



OUR RESERVATION, OUR ECLIPSE OUR LAUNCH COMPETITION



On August 21, 2017, a total solar eclipse will occur over the United States. The path of this historic event will pass directly over the lands of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation.

To celebrate this momentous event, Native American teams are invited to develop a high altitude balloon payload that will fly to the edge of space during the eclipse and gain an unprecedented view of the shadow of the moon on our Earth.

Eclipse Launch Competition Rules

- Northwest middle and high schools only, one team entry per grade level.
- The majority of team members need to be Native Americans, and each team must have an adult supervisor/mentor approved by the team's school.
- Entries must include names of students, grades and written permission from parent or guardian to participate.

To enter, each team must submit a one-page essay on the significance of the eclipse in their culture, and describe a small science payload (i.e. a temperature or pressure measurement tool) or a student-built artifact (i.e. a bracelet or mascot) to be photographed against the background of the eclipse. Top teams will receive a kit of basic materials to develop their payloads. Finalists will be selected in Spring 2017 and receive up to \$1,000 in travel support to attend the launch and community-led eclipse celebration on the Warm Springs Reservation. We will fly as many payloads as possible. All teams are encourage to attend but travel support will be limited to the most promising payloads.



The Path of the Total Solar Eclipse on August 21, 2017



A solar eclipse gives a rare opportunity to view the atmosphere of the sun with our own eyes. Besides seeing the sun's atmosphere (the corona) streaming off into space, structures of dense gas, called prominences, may also be visible. The generosity of the Warm Springs community provides an opportunity to experience to this event through the culture of the Northwest tribes.

The Selection Process

Each team begins the process by submitting a one-page proposal discussing the significance of the eclipse in their culture, and proposing a small science payload (i.e. a temperature or pressure measurement tool) or a student-built artifact (i.e. a bracelet or mascot) to be photographed against the background of the eclipse.

If your team is selected, your mentor will be sent instructions and basic materials (including a camera) for the development of your project. We anticipate providing kits for 20 student payloads.

Finalists are selected based on their progress reports. The winning teams will receive up \$1,000 of travel support to attend the launch of the balloons and observed the eclipse on the Warm Spring Reservation.

We will fly as many payloads as possible. All teams are encourage to attend but travel support will be limited to the most promising payloads.

All selected teams will receive an eclipse photo along with a photo of the launch. Every effort will be made to recover the student payloads and attached cameras but recovery is not guaranteed.

✓ October 15, 2016

Team proposals are due. Entries include a one-page essay and team member information.

✓ January 5, 2017

Payload kits will be sent to the selected teams, care of their adult mentor/supervisor.

✓ May 5, 2017

Progress report is due. Selection of the team finalists is based on these reports

✓ August 20, 2017

Pre-eclipse activities are planned including stargazing, rocketry & UAV demos, and community-led events.

✓ August 21, 2017


