1. Resolution No. 2016-30 Ramah Final Settlement Agreement-BIA Shortfall Indirect Shortfall

The Burns Paiute Tribe is a Class Member that filed suit for alleged under-payments of contract support costs by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, under the Indian-Self Determination and Education Assistance (ISDEAA) during fiscal years 1994-2013. The United States District Court, District of New Mexico, the Federal Judge approved the final settlement agreement and has appropriated approximately \$940,000,000.00 to the Burns Paiute Tribe. The Burns Paiute Tribal Council has identified how the settlement should be distributed within the Tribal Organization per a “Distribution of funds list” that reads:





OLD BUSINESS

1. Tribal Staff Pre-Meeting

The 2016 Tribal Council will be meeting with all staff Directors/Managers to inform the new council members of different departments, budgets and staff onboard. The meeting will take place 9/21/16 starting at 8:00 a.m. at the TC office. A Tribal Council Staff summary has been sent out to all managers to complete before the meeting date. The goal of the meeting is to bring council up to speed on current matters and develop communication plans to be a more effective, pro-active council.

2. Tribal Governance Ordinances

The Tribal Council wants to allow up to 2 Tribal Council members to be employed as Tribal employees. NAPOLS was tasked to draft up potential policy/procedural changes that will need be altered (constitution, TGO, employee handbook and draft ordinance). Council was asked to review the documents and give input – issue tabled.

3. Tribal Election Ordinances

Election Ordinances TC Resolution 2015-12 was discussed. Issue was tabled because Tribal elections are 11 months away.

4. BIA Equipment Request

Joe D., Dean A., and Jarvis K. met with Stan Speaks from the BIA on 9/14/16 where Mr. Speak asked for a formal letter regarding needs the BIA could assist the Tribe in receiving. Joe will draft up an email with the following requests: Dump-truck w/ backhoe & front end loader, Sander, Larger TC Vehicle, Elders Bus, Basketball Court Covering and office supplies.

5. Economic Development Opportunity with Confederated Tribes of Siletz

Deloris Pigsley from the Confederated Tribes of Siletz contacted the Burns Paiute Council for a potential partnership for Economic Development. A meeting has been set for 9/19/16 in Siletz, those who will attend are Joe D., Dean A., Lucas S., and Shayla B. The issue is tabled until we receive the information.

6. General Manager Position

The new council would like to set up a meeting with Building Communities, who are assisting the Tribe in hiring General Manager. Joe will contact Building Communities to set up a fact-to-face meeting.

7. Ramah Settlement Agreement

The Burns Paiute Tribe is a Class Member that filed suit for alleged under-payments of contract support costs by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, under the Indian-Self Determination and Education Assistance (ISDEEA) during fiscal years 1994-2013. The United States District Court, District of New Mexico, the Federal Judge approved the final settlement agreement in the exact amount of \$944,103.91 to the Burns Paiute Tribe. The final settlement agreement claim form was signed by Joe D., Kenton Dick-GM verified and claim form was sent back to the institution for payment.

8. Special General Council Meeting

A special council meeting will be hosted on 10/12/16 at 6:00 to inform the General Council on updates and receive community input. Additionally, TC will host 2016 Reservation Day celebration for the community. This will happen 10/13/16 at 1:00 at Gathering Center.







The Housing Authority recently received an onsite self-monitoring audit which included reviewing all our policies to make sure they are HUD compliant as well as review tenant files to make verify that all the supporting documents are in the files. . There are a few items that can be taken care of immediately, but the major thing is that we will need to update our policies. We will be working on these and once they are complete we will make them available to the public for comments. We will also be requesting T&TA from HUD on updating these policies to make sure they are up to date with the changes that have been implemented by the government. The T&TA will have to be approved by HUD and scheduled in 2017.


Our community was very blessed to have Rebecca Balog and Princella Red Corn from Native Love for trainings on Friday, October 7. They also made their presence during the pow wow.

The Domestic Violence Department had three trainings scheduled for Friday, October 7th. The first was for all school aged children. 20 of our Tu Wakii kids participated in conversation about what they think Native Love means. They were given markers and paper to draw their ideas. Elise and Anita also had the opportunity to learn as Rebecca and Princella engaged the children in conversation about family life and bullying. Photos were taken of each of the children with their drawing depicting their ideas of Native Love. Some of the youth received Native Love tees from a drawing.

The second training was for youth advocates. We had 5 staff members attend as well as one of the teachers from Slater Elementary school. This small group discussed some great ideas to encourage more involvement of our older youth in mentoring our younger ones as well as how to raise greater awareness about establishing and living within healthy relationships.

The third training was designed for parents and children. It was an opportunity for the parents of our youth to understand the program better and how it benefits children and the community as a whole. Rebecca and Princella felt so many people were getting ready for pow wow that it would be better to talk with people on Saturday and Sunday at the festivities.

Rebecca and Princella had a table both days of pow wow. They stayed very busy and took lots of photos with the white boards as people wrote what Native Love means to them. Their presence was well received and greatly appreciated. As many of you may have noticed they gave out t-shirts on Saturday as well. The ladies were very limited to how much they could bring with them. They took requests for more shirts from those attendees who wanted them.



One of the focuses of the Native Love program is a media campaign. You can find posts from the time Rebecca and Princella were here on the Native Love Facebook page at <https://www.facebook.com/nativeloveis/?fref=ts>, including the crowning of our new queen, Laevona Snapp.


Permission slips were obtained for all of our youth should any of the photos be used for upcoming posters and/or ad campaigns.

Rebecca will be getting more information to the Domestic Violence Department in the near future to meet specific needs of the youth of the Burns Paiute Tribe. This will include tool kits for the Domestic Violence and Education Departments.

Native Love has been to Oregon one other time for their initial launch project during Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month in February of 2015 when they presented at the Chemawa Indian School. Rebecca stated that, "to be back in Oregon during Domestic Violence Awareness Month was good mojo."

All in all Rebecca and Princella expressed their gratitude for being invited to the Burns Paiute community during the time of pow wow. They sponsored a dance special for youth 0-18. It was winner take all in which all the participants danced their best. \$150.00 was awarded to as well as two consolation prizes. A short video is on their Facebook page

Before our guests left to return to their families they stated they would love to come back to Burns and do more trainings.





The Cycle of Violence

The first violent attack often seems like an isolated event. But in many cases, after the violence first happens the following cycle develops:

- ***Tension builds***
Anger, arguing, blaming, verbal abuse
- ***Violence***
Hitting, slapping, kicking, choking, use of objects or weapons, sexual abuse, verbal threats and abuse
- ***Calm period***
The man/women denies may deny the violence, make excuses, say he/she is sorry, or promise it will never happen again.
As the violence goes on, the calm period gets shorter and shorter for many couples. As the women's/man's will is broken, the man's/women's control over his/her becomes so complete that it is no longer necessary for him/her to make promises that things will get better, some women/men try to make the violence happen so that it will be over with more quickly, and to get to the calm period sooner. It does not matter how much you love a person. Love cannot change someone. Only that person can choose to change himself/herself.







Breast Cancer Awareness

Other than skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common cancer among American women. Getting mammograms regularly can lower the risk of dying from breast cancer. The United States Preventive Services Task Force recommends that if you are 50 to 74 years old, be sure to have a screening mammogram every two years. If you are 40 to 49 years old, talk to your doctor about when to start and how often to get a screening mammogram.

What Are the Symptoms?

There are different symptoms of breast cancer, and some people have no symptoms at all. Symptoms can include any change in the size or the shape of the breast, pain in any area of the breast, nipple discharge other than breast milk (including blood), and a new lump in the breast or underarm. If you have any signs that worry you, see your doctor right away.

How Can I Lower My Risk?

The main factors that influence your risk for breast cancer include being a woman, being older (most breast cancers are found in women who are 50 years old or older), and having changes in your breast cancer genes (BRCA1 and BRCA2). Most women who get breast cancer have no known risk factors and no history of the disease in their families. There are things you can do to help lower your breast cancer risk. The [Know:BRCA tool](#) can help you assess your risk of having changes in your BRCA genes.

Although breast cancer screening cannot prevent breast cancer, it can help find breast cancer early, when it is easier to treat. Talk to your doctor about which breast cancer screening tests are right for you, and when you should have them.



CDC's *Bring Your Brave campaign* provides information about breast cancer to women younger than age 45 by sharing real stories about young women whose lives have been affected by breast cancer.

Fast Facts About Breast Cancer


- Each year in the United States, more than 200,000 women get breast cancer and more than 40,000 women die from the disease.
- Men also get breast cancer, but it is not very common. Less than 1% of breast cancers occur in men.
- Most breast cancers are found in women who are 50 years old or older, but breast cancer also affects younger women. About 10% of all new cases of breast cancer in the United States are found in women younger than 45 years of age.
